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BUGS, BUTTERFLIES & BIRDS ON THE MEADOW

In the early days of the reserve we had the benefit of a dedicated volunteer who was skilled at finding, identifying and photographing insects -Mick Ball - also known as the "bug man". Mick recorded well over a thousand different species and took pictures of many of them. Some of them will have already been there and some will have arrived due to the changes in habitat we generated by making the reserve. Some were rare finds for Derbyshire and some already indicated that creatures were gradually extended their ranges northwards as our climate warmed.

Since those early days there has been radical changes in the climate overall. Extreme events - whether rain, cold or droughts and heat all affect the ability of these smallest of creatures to survive. Consecutive heat wave spring and summers can mean a species has no time to recover and the reduced numbers mean fewer individuals the following year. If the trend continues the species is under threat of survival.

Have you seen many butterflies yet this year? In 2012 there were clouds of these beautiful insects on the reserve and walking along the paths there were tortoiseshells, peacocks, commas, speckled woods, whites of various sizes, orange tips and blues. Not so last year in the drought and sadly not so this year yet either.

We have the perfect habitats to suit the species mentioned. Many lay their eggs on nettles - hence the large nettle beds and path borders. The severe temperatures and dry weather jeopardises the food plants

geopardises the food plass for many species and sometimes the caterpillars cannot find enough to complete their life cycle.

For instance Red Admirals

and having laid their eggs on nettles, the next generation is usually on the wing from July onwards. The adults can stay around into the beginning of winter. They suffered a lot last spring/summer in the drought and the recent temperatures are having the same effect. The spiky black caterpillars of Peacock butterflies should be clustered on the nettles. So with the Tortoiseshell caterpillars but not much sign yet.

The main pond in the wetland will most certainly maintain some water as it goes up and down with the water table. By June this year at least one of the smaller ponds had dried up which will have had consequences for creatures that

live in it. Surprisingly, tadpoles and **efts** (young newts) develop more quickly in warmer water and may well have fully changed into adults before the water disappeared. This will

It is not all doom and gloom. The show of blossom earlier in the year will result in heavy cropping of fruit and nuts as long as the drought does not continue for too long. The flowers are spectacular and the skies above have iconic birds enjoying the insects that are borne aloft on the rising warm air currents - swifts, house martins and swallows.

The twittering of swallows and screaming of the swifts is a sound I remember from childhood. This year we have about 20 swifts that have come back to nest in the village and raise the next generation along with house martins and swallows.

How does a swift catch insects on the wing? It has amazing flying abilities swooping, jinking and diving in the air - with its large eyes able to see objects in fine detail up to three times farther away than people. Like most birds, a swift also has spectral sensitivity from near ultraviolet (UV) to red which is way beyond that of us humans. It declines to eat wasps and bees filling its crop of things like gnats, spiders, midges and mayflies stuck together with saliva to form a bolus (ball) which it can then regurgitate and feed to its young or swallow for itself.

Swifts will avoid heavy rain if they can - often flying for hundreds of kilometres around storm systems to ensure its food sources. The question of how **they navigate** has not yet been fully answered - including how they find their previous nesting site in Duffield having flown from Africa!

On a summer's day those sorts of questions can spring to mind whilst sitting watching the river, observing the bees on the comfrey flowers, listening to the birdsong, catching a glimpse of the kingfisher or a spider spinning a web.

The peace and tranquility is precious and to be savoured.



ECCLESBOURNE MULTI-ACADEMY TRUST UPDATE

I promised to update Duffield Scene readers on developments in my campaign in Parliament to prevent Ecclesbourne School from being forced to join a multi-academy trust (MAT). The Department for Education wish to force Ecclesbourne to join a MAT, using the excuse of a poor Ofsted report as the trigger.

As I explained, I believe that joining a MAT should never be a choice imposed upon a school without its consent, because it is an irreversible step. There is no mechanism to get out of a MAT, and I believe that they are entirely undemocratic. The parents of Ecclesbourne pupils, and local people, would no longer have a say in the management and governance of the school, except with the consent of the MAT board, which could be situated in another county.

Whilst some schools may choose to join a MAT for



entirely valid reasons, such as a desire to share staff, facilities or expertise with a nearby school with a similar academic focus, I have always campaigned for Ecclesbourne to retain its independence as it is a proudly local school, which has performed excellently for many years. This was the issue which took me into national politics in the first place,

and I am determined to fight against any irreversible and detrimental steps being taken which threaten Ecclesbourne's independence.

Since my last article, I have met with several ministers in the Department for Education, including the Secretary of State Gillian Keegan, to raise my concerns. I set out the issues with the Ofsted inspection, and why I don't believe it is right for the Department to force Ecclesbourne into a MAT against its will.

I am pleased that following this meeting, the Department have confirmed that the school will not be forced into a MAT until the Ofsted inspection has been repeated. I know that the school has been working hard since the last inspection to address any of the concerns raised, and this subsequent inspection provides opportunity for the school, and the Department, to make the right decisions for the future of Ecclesbourne and its pupils. I hope that the repeat inspection will demonstrate that Ecclesbourne is more than capable of making any necessary changes without being forced into an unsuitable MAT, and that this threat will then be removed once and for all.

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LOCAL & INTERNATIONAL FOOTBALL TOURNAMENTS

By beating Inter Milan 1-0 Manchester City became the UEFA Champions League winners (and completed 'the treble') on the 10th June at the Atatürk Olympic stadium. Whilst there was an occasion for celebration in Istanbul that night, earlier in the day football was very much the focus of interest at the Eyes Meadow Sports Ground as the 2023 Football Festival weekend hosted by the Duffield Dynamos began. This was efficiently organised and well attended. Arrangements and resources were such that up to eight pitches were available. Particular mention must be given to the numerous marshalls who were adept in keeping the traffic moving at busy times and provided parking management. Both the FA and the tournaments' organisers upheld the notion that football should be a safe and enjoyable experience for everyone; the objective being to have fun whilst showing respect for people and property. Due acknowledgement was also made by the organisers to the numerous sponsors (many local) who made the events possible. Teams had travelled on Saturday from nearby clubs including Allestree, Little Eaton and Holbrook: fixtures were also arranged with visitors from greater distances including Ashbourne and Mickleover. 
